SAINT MARY'S, BARRIE, 1855—1980

By the 1830's visiting priests from Toronto, Penetanguishene, and later Newmarket, were saying Mass in the private homes of the growing number of Catholics in Barrie and the surrounding townships. The great influx of Irish immigrants following the 1847 potato famine led to the building of the first Catholic Church in Barrie in 1850 and to its establishment as a parish in 1855 under its first Pastor, Rev. John Francis Jamot.

Shortly afterwards the first Catholic school was opened in Barrie. In 1857 the Sisters of St. Joseph came from Toronto to teach and engage in many other charitable activities. In 1861 Barrie became the seat of the Deanery of Simcoe and for many years its priests served other Catholic communities in central Simcoe County. In 1872 the second Catholic Church, a brick and stone edifice, was built on Mulcaster Street in downtown Barrie to replace the original heavy timber frame structure. In 1969 worship began in the present St. Mary's Church which was erected on this new location, the former site of the monastery of the Redemporistine nuns.

The plaque was blessed and dedicated on Pentecost Sunday, May 25, 1980, the 125th anniversary of the foundation of the parish, by His Eminence, G. Emmett Cardinal Carter, Archbishop of Toronto.

A structure was built in the late 1840's and was completed in 1850. The first church was made of Timber.


Fr. James Quinlan was the Pastor of Newmarket who served the mission of Barrie. It was under his leadership that plans for a church were begun.


The First Two St. Mary's Churches




The frame church in the background and the newly built brick church.


Translation Of The Latin Inscription on the Bell in front of the Church

Bishop Michael Power

A native of Halifax, Michael Power was founding bishop of the Diocese of Toronto and the first English-speaking bishop born in Canada. He arrived in Toronto in 1842 and quickly went to work building Canada's newest diocese, which at the time encompassed the Niagara Peninsula, all of southwest Ontario to Windsor and north to Lakes Huron and Superior.


Among his achievements was founding St. Michael's Cathedral. Construction began in April 1845; however, Bishop Power did not live to see it completed. While ministering to immigrants dying of typhus, he contracted the disease and died in 1847 shortly before his 43rd birthday.

He was buried beneath his unfinished cathedral.

Barrie's First Pastor, Father John Francis Jamot, 1828—1886



Rev. John Francis Jamot the founding Pastor of St. Mary's

St. Mary's first and founding Pastor, Father John Francis Jamot was born, in 1828 in a small village in the Diocese of Limoges in central France. He was ordained in 1853 and taught classics in a local college for a year.

In 1855 Jamot arrived in Canada and was straightaway assigned as Pastor of the new Parish in Barrie, which he built up in a thriving Christian community.

In 1863 Father Jamot was called from Barrie to Toronto where he became Rector of St. Michael's Cathedral as well as Vicar General and Chancellor of the Diocese. While at the cathedral he erected a spire on its tower and an iron fence around the grounds, both of which can still be readily seen. In 1882 he became the first Bishop of the newly created Diocese of Peterborough.

Sisters of Saint Joseph

The Sisters of St. Joseph, a teaching order, came to Barrie in 1857. The request for their coming was made by Father J.F. Jamot, the first Pastor of St. Mary's, who like the Sister of St. Joseph had his origins in France. The first religious vocation from Barrie was Sister Jerome Susanah McBride, who entered in August 1865. The Sisters of St. Joseph served the church in Barrie as educators until 1977.



Redemptoristines


